Plans for online youth programs are on the agenda of a few clubs, a perfect solution that parents and schools seem excited to participate in as well.

We have been inspired by some larger states that have both Environment and Legislative committees, and NCA will add those to our board. It is clear how important Advocacy is and being informed on all green issues on local, state and federal levels.

New Jersey




The Garden Club of New Jersey, Inc. has had many course corrections in the last few months as we were forced to become more creative in dealing with a new normal precipitated by the Corona Virus. The installation of our new website at: www.garden clubofnewjersey.org is at the

top of the list of our accomplishments. Kudos to GCNJ Board members Diana Kazazis, Ellen Preissler and our new website manager, Doug Guthrie, as we have a dynamic, interactive website that is user friendly with the ability to upload information quickly and artfully.

The GCNJ is extremely proud of the direction we have undertaken with the realization in mid-July that my President's Theme, "Paths to Discovery Through Outdoor Learning Centers" was at a dead-end at Rutgers Gardens. The door immediately opened, with GCNJ joining the Coalition of 84 (now 93 & counting) other organizations to pass the Liberty State Park Protection Act and Save the Park's Caven Point Natural Area. Liberty State Park is New Jersey's Central Park and more, as it is owned by the State of NJ and maintained by New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection. This 1200 acres, 600 of land and 600 of water is located in Jersey City and looks out to the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island and the Manhattan skyline. It is an urban oasis, a critical link of the Atlantic Migratory Flyway and was gifted to the Nation to celebrate our country's bicentennial in 1976. The GCNJ's Environmental Chair Beverly Kazickas has led the GCNJ's 102+ clubs and 4200+ members to advocate for the Senate and Assembly bills that would preserve this jewel for us and future generations.

After GCNJ's June Annual Meeting, "Pollinators on Parade", was cancelled, we awarded 10 Presidential Citations and swore in our GCNJ Executive Officers on June 22, 2020 at our 1st Virtual Zoom Meeting with just the GCNJ Board in attendance. We are finding out that more members are attending these meetings, and more positives are apparent as we can socialize, attend to business, and walk out to our own gardens, saving time and travel. The GCNJ is advocating for the Issuance of Protect Pollinator License Plates. In our efforts to advocate for conservation and the environment, we adopted a GCNJ Conservation Pledge joining our GCNJ Mission Statement. Both can be viewed on our new website.



The Garden Club of New Jersey has had one Blue Star dedication sponsored by West Trenton GC in Mercer County, and two more dedications on Veteran's Day November 11, 2020 sponsored by Haddonfield GC in Camden County and Neshanic GC in Somerset County. We also have two on order for Passaic County and Cape May County, and are planning three more in Woodbury, Gloucester County, Sussex State Fairgrounds in Sussex County and at Liberty State Park in Hudson County. We're hoping to bring a Pollinator Learning Center, an interactive display to engage the public in learning more about pollinators and the fact they provide 1/3 of the food we eat, to Liberty State Park. The GCNJ welcomed two new clubs, the Hackensack Community GC and Wisdom's Promise, an intergenerational garden club in Newark. Barbara Weiland, President of Wisdom's Promise and Founder/Director of Kids in Business, provided 1,000 pumpkin pie pumpkins to kids throughout Newark in place of trick or treating, inspiring our clubs throughout New Jersey to follow suit.

Our Burpee seed project is gaining national attention!

Almost 40,000 seed packets were distributed to our ten Districts which sent them on to our 113 clubs which used them in a variety of ways. From Rosie's first attempt at growing vegetables and her pride at producing Radishes to Karen's Spicy Saber Basil, the article in TNG highlights the distribution of seed packets under less than optimal conditions and shows the results of our efforts in picture after picture. Some clubs used the seeds in community gardens and later distributed the harvest to local food banks. I'm told we have more than 450 responses to our request for pictures of the Burpee Challenge.

Congratulations to Chambersburg Garden Club, a winner of this year's Plant America Grant, also mentioned in TNG. Over the years, Pennsylvania has had winners of Plant America, Ames Tools and Espoma Co. grants. PA is a winning state in all respects. This year we held the first in the nation all Zoom Gardening School to accolades from participants, some using Zoom for the very first time. We've held two of our GCFP Board meetings on Zoom with almost full attendance each time.

Our experience with Zoom has encouraged us to again make the difficult decision to cancel our 91st Annual Convention scheduled for mid-April 2021. All indications are that this pandemic will be with us for some time to come. When NGC cancelled their highly anticipated National Convention for the second time, handwriting was on the wall that we must keep our members safe despite the longing we have to see each other and connect in person. We will use the model set forth by CAR-SGC for their highly successful "Blooming Zoom" festival to create "Zooming into Spring", the GCFP 2021 Convention

on Zoom. Our District IV and the current Convention Committee have graciously agreed to switch gears from a live to a virtual presentation. We fully expect a well-attended, enjoyable educational experience that in addition to our usual convention participants will attract members unable to travel and those who would not normally think of attending a convention. My challenge to our members - learn how to use your phone or computer to Zoom between now and April! I'd like to "see" you all in the spring as we gather to celebrate 91 years of gardening and continue Growing our Legacy.

She believes "plants are important to maintaining human health and culture, as well as ecosystem function." Hannah's plans are to use the \$2,000 scholarship to offset the expenses for her required summer field season where she will be working to collect plant samples that will be used to analyze fungal endophyte diversity. After completing her M.S., she plans on entering a Ph.D program to study the patterns of fungal endophyte biodiversity, the ecological niches occupied by fungal endophytes and the effect on the community composition.


Liaison to Master Gardeners/Education Programs

First NGC Beta Zoom Gardening School



Beta testing is the final round of testing before a product is finally released to a wide audience. The objective is to uncover as many bugs or usability issues as possible in this controlled setting.

The first NGC Beta Zoom Gardening School was held July 21-22, 2020 in Pennsylvania. Local Co-Chairs, Sharon Richardson and Mary Jo Schlomann, had scheduled Course 3 at the 1756 Uwchlan Meeting House in Exton, PA when the first news about COVID-19 was released. All the speakers were already approved and were ready to go. By early April, it was obvious that 'in person' classes would not be possible. We learned that NGC was working on a plan using Zoom and the NGC Environmental, Gardening, and Landscape Design School Chairs met and approved guidelines for holding schools using Zoom. The Gardening School Chairs took the lead and planned three Zoom Beta Courses, with Pennsylvania leading the way!

Switching from an 'in person' class to Zoom was a challenge. The brochure, budget, speaker agreements, registration spreadsheets and additional forms all had to be revised. Many of the students and consultants who planned to attend had never participated in a Zoom Session and they were apprehensive. Zoom training sessions were given prior to the course to ensure all attendees were able to sign on and use the functions in Zoom.

The first Zoom Beta Gardening School was held on schedule and was attended by 38 people - NGC Officers, NGC Gardening School Accrediting Chairs, our GCFP President, Joyce Milberg, and students, consultants, and proctors from ten states (Connecticut, Florida, Michigan, Missouri, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Washington, Wisconsin and West Virginia.) Five students who attended the Zoom Course achieved Consultant Status and one Consultant achieved Master Status. Of the students achieving Consultant Status, one had never used a computer prior to the Zoom Course.

The school received resoundingly good evaluations. Many of the positive comments commended the chairs on the speakers and the content. Some people expressed appreciation for not having to travel and for the reduced cost of the course. One negative aspect was that participants missed having personal contact with the other participants. We garden club members are a friendly, chatty bunch, so we missed the comradery of a live course.

NGC has now held four Zoom Beta Courses for the various schools and developed final guidelines for future courses. Garden club members will be able to attend courses in any state via Zoom and remain in their jammies by checking out NGC's website and signing up.

Winners were:

Jean Ladson Outstanding Garden Club Achievement Award:

Small Club: Judges Study Class of Garden Club of Ohio for a Petite Standard Flower Show held at Maple Knoll Retirement Center. Members of the garden club held three workshops for the residents prior to the Show.

Medium Club: Warren Garden Club of Garden Club of New Jersey - Club members worked with children ages three to five during Story Hour/Craft at their local library, selecting garden related stories and providing garden related projects. At one meeting, the children created heart shaped bird feeders.

Large Club: Western Hills Garden Club of Garden Club of Ohio -Club members sponsored a Standard Flower Show which also involved residents of a retirement and wellness community.
