

XERISCAPING- Water-Smart Gardening

As we are facing a drought in the Central Atlantic Region with high fire warnings every day in Southwestern NY, I thought this an opportune time to address Xeriscaping.

Principles of Xeriscaping

Grown plants suited for your region

Use trees, shrubs, perennials, vines and annuals that require less water, but can sustain short rainy periods.

Incorporate native plants into your landscape.

Zones in our region have changed! Areas in Ohio are now 5 and 6 as are PA and NY. New Jersey and DC, Maryland and Delaware are Zones 6 and 7.

Variety is a bonus to the landscape. Too many oak trees will spread their roots far and wide and suck the moisture out around the soil of perennials and annuals. Other native trees send out suckers that crowd the roots of competing shrubs and flowering plants. Trumpet Vine is gorgeous in flower but spreads by runners and the vines cling to whatever is growing near it.

I have included a list of plants growing in zones 4-8. **Sun**

Hemerocallis. Interplant with Iris to keep the deer away.

Nepeta-Catmint, Perovskia- Russian Sage are shrublike and purple flowered.

Antennaria or Pussytoes is an unusual ground cover that is beautiful in the spring.

Sedum-Autumn Joy, is truly a joy to behold in the late summer fall.

Shade

Alchemilla mollis. I have grown this and it never disappoints. The leaves are beautiful in floral arrangements and it will tolerate some sun.

Brunnera macrophylla

Campanula as a ground cover. Will spread. Needs full sun in cooler climates.

Heuchera and Tiarella light up shade areas with their jewel colored leaves and delicate flowers.

Gardening is always a challenge so experiment with something new that may surprise you!

America's Smallest Turtle

The critically endangered Bog Turtle, the smallest North American turtle, has been studied in Massachusetts by wildlife conservationist, Angela Sirois-Pitel, for 20 years . Bog Turtles are a healthy sign of a healthy fen- a rare wetland type, of which other rare species would inhabit. Since the 1980's, her team has tracked Turtles in lots of ways: surveys, radio transmitters and now camera traps on buckets. They take a five-gallon bucket and cut holes in the sides so that when you flip it upside down, something can walk through it. Then they mount a camera inside the bottom of the bucket so when it's tipped upside down, the camera is looking at the



ground. Bog Turtles have these rivulets on the ground when they move around. They are like little roads. This method is a way to explore the new sites as well as to get better data about existing sites. Because

of these camera traps, they hope to find new Bog Turtle sites where the conditions are good.

Landslides and Glaciers

A mysterious event recently puzzled seismologists around the world who noted there was a rhythmic signal that pulsed every 90 seconds for nine days? Some of you may have read about it as there were several articles in the newspapers but the signal continued to baffle everyone. So what was it?

Eventually, scientists used seismic data to pin the location down to Dickson Fjord, situated in a remote area in East Greenland. Upon investigation they discovered that a massive landslide of approximately 25 meters of rock (equivalent to 25 Empire State buildings) carrying glacial ice with it had collapsed and slid into the fjord. The sub-sequent wave this generated was estimated at 200 meters high and since the fjord was inland and narrow this caused a giant tsunami which sloshed back and forth against the rock walls generating the vibrations.

The detective mission to find the source of the mysterious signal involved an international team of scientists and the Danish Navy. The results of their efforts have been published in the journal Science and a subsequent article on the BBC News.

Landslides and glaciers melting are happening more and more frequently due to climate change so we can probably expect to experience more events like this in the future.

- *The State Youth Chairman sends the <u>state first</u> <u>place winner</u> to me, CAR-SGC NGC Youth Sculture Contest Chair, after the selection has been made, <u>but no later than December 31, 2024.</u>
