Forest Fires, Flooding in the Desert and New York City.....reading the Weather Headlines is certainly cause for concern, and highlights the need for all of us to take action. This month I'll share some ideas for your clubs.



**Plant a Tree!** Scientists will tell you that planting at tree is one of the healthiest actions we can take, because they:

- Cool our cities and streets by blocking sunlight and providing shade.
- Improve our air quality by filtering harmful dust and pollutants such as ozone, carbon monoxide, and sulfur dioxide from the air we breathe.
- Give off oxygen that we need to breathe.
- Mature trees protect communities against flash floods and landslides.
- Many species of wildlife depend on trees for habitat by providing food, protection, and homes for many birds and mammals.

Recognizing the importance of trees, our State has rolled out the **Five Million Trees Initiative**. "The 5 Million Trees Initiative was mandated by legislation, the Tree Solutions Now Act of 2021. Part of this legislation included an historic directive to plant 5 million native trees on public and private land by 2031. These trees are in addition to standard state planting levels - so with more than six million people living in Maryland, at least one tree will be planted for each resident by 2031." There are several programs for individuals and Garden Clubs that help you purchase trees at a reduced cost:

**TREE-MENDOUS MARYLAND,** a program of the Maryland Forest Service, is aimed at helping citizens restore tree cover on public land and community open space in Maryland. To date, they have assisted more than 3,000 towns and communities, parks, and schools planting trees and shrubs. The hope is to assist local governments and community groups to plant trees at a reduced cost to benefit every Marylander".

Request a free shipping label from their website below, gather and put your materials in a box, and send them to be recycled and turned into useful items like park benches, clothes and more. 

# Alice Rush McKeon Tree Plantings - 2022 and 2023 .....Susie Middleton

# The Alice Rush McKeon Tree Planting Program

Since 1979 the Federated Garden Clubs of Maryland has sponsored an annual tree planting program. Funded by a bequest from Alice Rush McKeon, the program carries her name. This is an event that passes sequentially to each of the five districts of the Federated Garden Clubs of Maryland.

The **District IV 2022 Planting** was delayed, but took place mid-September in the Marble Hill Neighborhood of Baltimore. Spear-headed by the Bolton Hill Garden Club, partnering with the Historic



**District V 2023 Planting** The initial native tree planting was held on September 30, 2023 at Gilmore C. Trout Memorial Park. Garden Club members collaborated with Walkersville Community leaders and citizens, and members of the Department of Natural Resources. The TREEmendous MD tree program allowed them to purchase the trees at a great discount and thus they had sufficient funds to plant in two additional sites. The September event was an actual planting of 24 native trees, so it was all-hands-on deck, attended by garden club members and their family members, boy scouts, high school students with their teacher and his 1-year-old toddler, members of the Forestry Service, and members of Walkersville Parks and Recreation. Additional plantings took place at the FCPS Earth, Space and



Science Lab Arboretum (8 trees) in Frederick and 25 trees were planted in a Thurmont park.

One of the most important things about the District IV and District V Tree Planting projects was the collaboration with local community organizations and leaders. Because of that, they were able to accomplish much more.

# Unity Gardens' Grant and Community Collaboration Enable a "New Native Plant Garden"

**Bayside Bloomers GC, District II** was awarded a generous **Unity Gardens' grant** to purchase 70 native shrubs and trees to replace mature, non-native, and aggressive landscaping in 1,400 square feet of foundation beds at Our Shepherd Lutheran Church in Severna Park.

The Club's "Operation Plant Native" recognizes the church's service to the community. The church founded "Serving People Across Neighborhoods" and provides a food pantry and an emergency assistance network to help residents. It also administers a highly regarded preschool, sponsors a boy scout troop, and provides free meeting space for several FGCMD-affiliated garden clubs and other groups.



The Bloomers kicked off its project in consultation with Alison Milligan, a nationally known expert and native plant champion, who serves as a Maryland Master Gardener, Master Naturalist, and an Anne Arundel County Watershed Steward. Selection of native plants specifically addressed site conditions to create habitat and food for wildlife and pollinators. Project volunteers, including Club members and others



recruited by the Club, worked diligently for 2 months in the oppressive August heat to remove ivy and common periwinkle rooted in weed-barrier 6-inches under the soil and deep, tangled shrub and tree roots.

At the end of September, the volunteers planted natives, installed soaker hoses, amended the beds with 10 cubic-yards of Leafgro, laid cardboard, and spread 8 cubic-yards of mulch. For spring color and to coincide with the District II Daffodil Show, volunteers also planted more than 300 daffodil bulbs.

The project was made possible by assistance of six non-profits, including Unity Gardens, Good Neighbors Group, church volunteers, Scouts, Maryland Reentry Resource Center, along with donations from: Anne Arundel County Farm, Lawn & Garden; Patuxent Nursery; Homestead Gardens; and Sam the Stumpologist. The Bayside Bloomers' partnerships created a powerful network to plant native in Maryland!

**FGCMD Bylaws updates!** Club Presidents, as you know there were several significant amendments to the FGCMD Bylaws at our Annual Meeting in March. Some of these may affect your Club Bylaws. The new FGCMD Bylaws are on the fgcofmd.org website under "Member Support". <a href="fgcofmd.org/membersupport/">fgcofmd.org/membersupport/</a>

If your Club uses Article II – Section 1. – B – Purposes, Prohibitions and Provisions for Dissolution in your bylaws, you will need to change that Section to read "To create civic beauty and to work for the improvement and protection of roadsides and parks."

**Bylaws referring to communication** – if your Club uses electronic notifications and communications, and your bylaws states by written or by mail – you will need to change those sections to **electronic or electronically** 

**Electronic/Virtual Meetings** – if your Club Bylaws do not state that you may conduct meetings Electronically/Virtually you will need to change that section(s) in your bylaws. Below is the new FGCMD Bylaw referring to this to give you an example:

Meetings of the Board of Directors, all Committees and the FGCMD Membership may be conducted through the use of virtual meeting services designated by the President or the Chairman calling the meeting. These virtual services shall only be used in case of an emergency, support anonymous voting and support visible displays identifying those participating, identifying those seeking recognition to speak, showing (or permitting the retrieval of) the test of pending motions, showing the results of votes. These electronic meetings shall be subject to all rules adopted by the Board, or by the Committee, to govern them, which may include any reasonable limitations on, and requirements for members' participation. Any such rules adopted by the Board shall supersede any conflicting rules in the parliamentary authority but may not otherwise conflict with or alter any rule or decision of the FGCMD. An anonymous vote conducted through the designated virtual meeting service shall be deemed a ballot vote, fulfilling any requirement in the bylaws or rules that a vote be conducted by ballot.

(Maryland State Code requires this provision.- for an incorporated entity.)

**FYI – Districts Organization; Officers and Board; and District Meetings and Voting** were all revised in the new FGCMD Bylaws.

**We suggest you review Nomination Procedure** in your Club Bylaws. This Article is completely revised in the FGCMD Bylaws. This will give you an example which could be shortened in your bylaws if you have Standing Rules or Policies in your Club.

**Officers** <u>Elections and Terms of Office</u> We suggest the that Club Bylaws state how your slate is presented and voted on, as well as the length of term of office.

**Amendments to Bylaws** – Club Bylaws need to state the procedure of how the Amendments to your bylaws are conducted.

# **Amendments to Bylaws Declared Emergency**

Your Club Bylaws need to state how your Club would handle and Annual Meeting, should there be an emergency. FGCMD now states: If a FGCMD annual meeting cannot be held, in the event of a National Emergency, these Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote by balloting using an Internet service that supports anonymous voting following the procedures outlined in ARTICLE IV.

### Plastics! What to do about them?

They are here to stay, in more ways than one. They can be called "Forever Plastics". They never break down and are found in our bodies, our clothing and our food. But we do have some control over our use of them. We can choose when and what we use. Obviously, we don't have a choice in the doctor's office or in the hospital, but we can make different choices in our day-to-day lives. Do you use reusable shopping bags? Do you return to the store any bags you do get? Do you store your leftovers in plastic or glass containers? Do you use Saran or plastic wrap? Do you buy your fruits and vegetables in clamshells? Is there a farmers' market where you can buy your produce "loose" i.e. not prepackaged? Do you reuse those plastic pots you get your plants in, or return them? If we try to think about what is sustainable, what is recyclable, we can reduce demand. It doesn't hurt to ask – please don't send me the merchandise wrapped in plastic. Please don't use Styrofoam peanuts in the packing material. The power of one, and all of us together, can make a difference.

Anyone can attend these conferences and you should seriously consider it.


Here are a few of the programs I participated in:

We are very fortunate and pleased to have well known floral designer Jane Godshalk as the program presenter, "Designs Inspired by Nature". Jane Godshalk, AIFD, earned a MBA in Organizational Behavior before discovering her life's passion, working with flowers. At first, Jane was totally immersed into the study of floral design, including certificates from Longwood Gardens, the Stoas University in the Netherlands, and a fourth level teaching certificate in Sogetsu Ikebana. She is an Artistic Judge for the Garden Club of America and a Certified Evaluator

for the American Institute of Floral Design. Her book "Flower Arranging Secrets" demystifies the art of floral design in an eco-friendly way. Jane has represented the USA at the Chelsea Flower Show in London and as an international demonstrator at the World Association of Flower Arrangers in Dublin. Both the American Horticultural Society and the Garden Club of America have recognized Jane with national medals. She has served

# Native Orchids... Saving our 52 Native Maryland Species ... Tina Swanson

I attended a presentation by Dr. Dennis Whigham from the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center in Edgewater, MD discussing the decline of the 52 Maryland native orchids and roughly 250 native orchid species in the U.S. and Canada.. The Orchidaceae family has at least 25,000 species worldwide (the largest plant family on earth). 50% of all orchids are tropical epiphytes... the type you see on display at botanic gardens and can buy from florists, grocery stores, etc. Our Maryland native orchids have a very complex life cycle involving a wide range of interactions with plants, animals, and especially fungi and are very sensitive to environmental changes. Dr. Whigham refers to orchids as a "canary in the coal mine" plant. 57% of our country's orchids are listed as threatened or endangered on the local, state, or federal level.



The Smithsonian Native Orchid Conservation Research Center is in phase 2 of its 3 phase plan that includes:

- 1. Partnerships, creating an interactive website featuring all of the native orchids in the U.S and Canada, develop plans for orchid seed and fungal banks and orchid propagation.
- 2. Establish regional, national, and international partnerships to collect samples for seed & fungal banks and initiate propagation, develop K-12 and inter-generational group educational activities, and expand native orchid and fungi research.
- 3. Establish endowment to assure long term success, establish sustainable populations of native orchis in botanic gardens in U.S. and Canada, continue research, restore native orchids in the wild.

# **HEIRLOOM GARDENING** ..... Joan Walker, Chartwell GC

Imagine growing a pumpkin that was also present on the Pilgrim's table at the first Thanksgiving dinner! How about eating a tomato that shares the same seeds that Thomas Jefferson planted in his garden at Monticello?

You may have eaten Heirloom tomatoes in your summer salad or enjoyed Heirloom roses in your garden this summer. The definition of Heirloom is: something handed on from one generation to another. In horticulture, heirloom is any vegetable or flower that the seed has been saved and grown over many years. The seeds are preserved and passed down by the gardener.

Heirloom flowers and vegetables have been raised in gardens since the 1850's. However, age alone doesn't qualify a flower or vegetable as an Heirloom. All Heirloom flowers and vegetables are "open-pollinated," which means they are pollinated as nature

intended — by insects, birds, wind — not through human intervention with the pollination. The resulting generation thus breeds true, with roughly the same characteristics as the parent plant. Sometimes vegetables look odd because they are not grown for uniform size or shape, but for their unbeatable taste, as in Heirloom tomatoes. Unique and flavorful vegetable varieties have

been around for some years. Heirlooms also include plants developed by seed companies and market gardeners in the past. Some beloved backyard mixes have emerged from home gardens and been carefully saved and passed along to become commercial

varieties. Some commercial heirlooms are imported from Europe, South America and Asia.

Hybrids came along in the 1950 -1970's. Vegetable hybrids were created for better shipping, durability, disease resistance and marketability. However, they often lack the taste and character of heirlooms. Hybrid flower varieties were developed for desired traits such as color, heat resistance and height.

Heirloom products are often more expensive because they aren't mass produced. There are fewer supplies on the market. Farmers must dedicate more time and resources to carefully harvesting fragile hybrid products.

Some popular Heirloom flowers are: zinnia, sunflower, poppy, cosmos and nasturtium.

Some popular Heirloom vegetables are: tomatoes, cucumbers, asparagus, beets and corn.

# Photography Tips! .... Chair Mary Ellen Pluemer

Hide a document on your phone! Any items you want available but not in public view (ex: passport, vaccination document, boarding passes, applications, etc.)?? Set up a Hidden Album! Take photo. Tap on the photo. Tap on the three dots icon at top right of page. Tap 'Hide". The photo will go into a hidden album for only you to access as needed!

# Why are my photos blurry???

• Lens is dirty!

Solution: Clean it regularly!

• Movement if hands are not steady, especially in low light! *Solution:* Keep arms close to body. Or, use 3 second timer setting setting to delay shutter opening.

• Focus not set correctly!

**Solution:** Auto focus usually works. Objects close to your iPhone screen may need focus adjustments. Choose the object to focus on. Tap the screen when object is in position. Tap the yellow box that appears. This will direct the focus to the chosen image.

# Judges Council ... Chair Anna O'Kelly

We reviewed how to create and judge **Exhibition Tables** at our recent Judges Council meeting. Master Judge Paula Winkler created an example for discussion. The next time you are having a flower show, why not consider a class of Exhibition Tables? You may wonder "What are Exhibition Tables?"

Exhibition Tables according to the NGC Flower Show Handbook,

- 1. They are created artistically to suggest the service of food with no requirements as to the type or number of table appointments,
- 2. Schedule may not specify table components or their numbers,
- 3. Plant material must be used as needed for the overall design.

### Whereas **Functional Tables** are:

- 1. Planned and set for the actual service of food,
- 2. Convenience and sense of order must prevail,
- 3. A completed floral design must be included.

# Christmas Cactus?? .....Tina Swanson


So..do you actually have a Christmas Cactus ...or is it a Thanksgiving or Easter Cactus? The three cacti are closely related species. They are all tropical epiphytic cacti, native to the coastal mountains of southeastern Brazil. Thanksgiving cacti flower from mid to late November into December and Christmas cacti flower mid to late December into January. Easter cacti flower from March to May. These species are very easily propagated. Some have been passed down in families though generations for more than 100 years.

In their native tropical habitat, the epiphytes grow on other plants and in trees like orchids. Their shallow root system helps the cacti cling to the host plant. Epiphytes take in nutrients and water through their leaves and shallow roots from the air, rain, and organic matter that collects on the host plant. Loose, sandy soil that drains well is the best choice for your holiday cactus.


groups to explore plant life along the bike path on one of the year's hottest days. Educational, fun, and lots of laughing!



Concerned about the threat to this unique species due to loss of habitat, Donna became a self-taught expert and operates the sanctuary from her home in Churchville, Maryland. Members were able to see all stages of the monarch butterfly's life cycle: from eggs deposited on milkweed



leaves, to caterpillars and the emerging chrysalis, through to the adult butterfly. Donnaexplained what we

Wiltondale GC is happy to announce that funds raised through our plant sales have been put to great use to support our neighbors in Historic East Towson at Adelaide Bentley Park. Phase one of the two- phase project built the 'infrastructure' of the park, giving it an identity and defined its purpose. In one amazing day, volunteers constructed raised garden beds, a deck platform, benches for community gatherings, an arbor defining the entrance, and a tremendous amount of mulching, weeding, and planting. Our Wiltondale GC donated the cost of materials, and looks forward to working with the community to share gardening knowledge and projects for all ages in the future, as East Towson residents join together to plant in the garden beds.



Woodbrook-Murray Hill GC visited Soldiers Delight Natural Environmental Area in Owings Mills for our October meeting. Soldiers Delight is the largest remaining serpentine grasslands area in the eastern United States. Paula Becker, Outreach Ecologist with the state Department of Natural Resources, spoke on the serpentine barrens ecology, the rare and endangered plants that grow only there, and the "prescribed burns" and non-prescribed fire of April 2023. Paula then led club members on a short hike to view the restored grasslands and endangered flora.

York Manor GC held its September meeting at the Herring Run Nursery. Rob Jenkins of Blue Water Baltimore (BWB) and Herring Run Nursery spoke enthusiastically about Bluewater Baltimore which is an environmental nonprofit organization working to keep the Chesapeake watershed clean. We'll register our project to be part of Doug Tallamy's "Home Grown National Park" initiative: About Us - Homegrown National Park We've removed 8 huge invasive Burning Bushes (Euonymus alatus) and Japanese honeysuckle, allowing space to plant species that support wildlife. Educational signs for the public will be included in the project. Both organizations are funding the park renovation.
