The show featured five divisions: Horticulture, Design, Education, Botanical Arts, Youth, and Photography. A total of 253 horticulture exhibits highlighted the remarkable diversity and beauty of plants grown throughout the region. Floral designs showcased exceptional artistry, imagination, and skill, while the educational and photography exhibits captured the rich heritage, natural beauty, and unique character of Maryland's Eastern Shore.

Top honors were awarded to Julia Miller of Talbot County Garden Club (TCGC), who received the NGC Award of Horticulture Excellence, and Shelly Johnson of Green-Walled Garden Club (GWGC) (District V), who earned the NGC Award of Design Excellence. In addition to other NGC top exhibitor awards, District I presented 10 perpetual awards recognizing outstanding achievements in horticulture and design.

Success of this event was made possible through the dedication of countless volunteers, exhibitors committee members, judges and supporters. Their hard work and enthusiasm created an unforgettable experience for both participants and visitors, making Celebrating Maryland's Eastern Shore a truly memorable showcase of gardening excellence and community spirit.

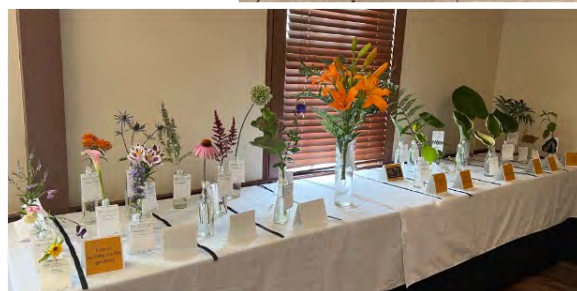

At the same time, preparations were being made for the two major events of the year: the 2026 Maryland House and Garden Pilgrimage and the District I Flower Show hosted by TCGC. These events take tremendous planning, well over a year, involving almost every member of TCGC; thankfully, both events were spectacular.

The Maryland House & Garden Pilgrimage on May 9 showcased the many significant historic sites in our county to deliver an extraordinary experience in celebration of America's 250th Anniversary. Each property featured an array of houses, gardens and grounds that are rarely open to the public. At each property, visitors saw incredible floral displays creatively fashioned by the club's talented designers – a hallmark of this biennial event. Waterfront homes opened to tour included Wye House (where Frederick Douglas lived in his youth) and Plimhimmon (where Anna Maria Tilghman, widow of Revolutionary War hero Lt. Col. Tench Tilghman, entertained the Marquis de Lafayette), plus Emerson Point (on the Miles River). The spectacular grounds of Harleigh Farm (on Trippe Creek) also welcomed visitors. Tours and lunch were available at Third Haven Friends (Quaker) Meeting House (1684) in Easton. The success of this tour is not always registered by the number of visitors (this year we had over 1,800), but by the smiles on our guests faces, the interest in the history of the properties, and the compliments on the extraordinary floral designs of our members.



District I Standard Flower Show Team

On June 18, after more than a year of planning, the District I NGC Standard Flower Show hosted by TCGC was held at The Packing House in Cambridge. The Chairman of the show was Boots Michalak, TCGC Member and Accredited Flower Show Judge; her co-chair was Susan Fletcher, President of Worcester County Garden Club.

The Show included Divisions for Horticulture, Design, Education, Youth, Botanical Arts, and a special Horticulture Challenge Class. Maryland Native Plant Month The benefits of sustaining native plants are essential to Maryland for many reasons. Native plants are of utmost importance to the survival of pollinators and wildlife providing critical nectar, pollen, sites for bees, butterflies and native birds. Native plants protect the Chesapeake Bay. They require fewer fertilizers and pesticides, reducing toxic runoff. Their deep roots trap and filter pollutants and prevent shoreline and topsoil erosion. Native plants are drought resistant as they have adapted to our humid summers and variable rainfall. Their use in our gardens limits the spread of invasive species and enhances a sustainable living environment.

All this brings us to a new provision from the Maryland Legislature. To recognize the benefits that native plants have on Maryland's natural environment, the legislators are requiring Governor Moore and all subsequent governors to proclaim **May as Maryland Native Plant Month** each year. A bill to make it permanent is still in progress and has not yet been passed into law.

This program still requires an order from the governor each year urging educational and environmental organizations and businesses to observe Maryland Native Plant Month appropriately. The effective date of this provision is October 1, 2026. The Maryland Native Plant program backs the Maryland's State Agencies in prioritizing native planting throughout the state. Invest in your environment by planting native species.

Manor Gardener Louise Larson offered some tips about successfully caring for orchids: They prefer terra cotta pots, which allow orchids to breathe; transplant into orchid bark unless in moss only, in which case use 50% bark, 50% moss; never let roots sit in water; and orchids prefer full western sun.

Dreaming of outdoors, members met with Harford County Master Gardeners, Joan Parris and Dan Gustitis, who shared advice about tomatoes, their ID codes, the difference between determinate and indeterminate tomato plants, when to start seeds, and how to care for the plants during the growing season.

Early in March, the club celebrated its favorite photographer, Sharon Kollman, who placed in the region's photo contest and received her award at the District Luncheon! Her winning photo is shown.

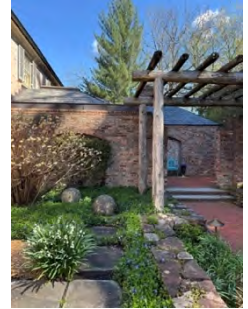

At the March Green-walled Garden Club meeting, Brandon Carbary, horticulturist and landscape designer specializing in applied ecological design, landscape systems management, and horticultural education, presented "Hillside Plantings as Climate Infrastructure."

He discussed the process of converting a steep hillside and terraces from lawn (and ruts) into pollinator gardens at Buckingham's Choice in Frederick. Brandon also demonstrated a computer-generated software for roll-out gardens, including landscape design software that helps to map out, visualize and calculate plant spacing and customized and pre-planned layouts for garden plantings.

His professional experience spans landscape and horticultural work for private golf clubs and university environments, including arboriculture, integrated pest management, GIS-based tree inventories, and ornamental landscape planning. Brandon's work emphasizes the translation of ecological theory into practical, maintainable landscapes and includes a strong pedagogical component through curriculum-aligned partnerships, public lectures, and educational programming. His work has been featured on horticulture-focused podcasts and in televised landscape settings, reflecting a commitment to public-facing scholarship and applied outreach.

He is the founder of Ecoplantia, an online nursery providing Roll-Out Gardens™ where he developed a biodegradable, life-size garden template system for regionally specific native plant installations across the United States. In April of 2024, a retail garden center was opened in Frederick, where they are active in the community providing plants, education, and landscaping services.

The Mountain Laurel Garden Club (MLGC) hosted another highly successful community plant sale on June 13 at the Glades Pavilion in downtown Oakland. In just two hours, shoppers purchased 768 plants, making the event one of the club's most successful fundraisers and educational outreach efforts. A major contributor to the sale's success was Co-President and Horticulture Chair Barb Davis, who began sowing seeds in March and nurtured, transplanted, and repotted more than 400 plants for the event. Additional plants were divided from established MLGC gardens throughout the community, including the Oakland Library garden and native plant gardens previously installed by the club for Habitat for Humanity.

The sale featured a variety of interesting perennial plants from members' gardens that have proven to thrive in Western Maryland. Special recognition goes to Julie Crolius who contributed more than 100 non-invasive plants, including unique pineapple lily (*Eucomis* 'Princess Bride') bulbs and yellow trillium (*Trillium luteum*) from her abundant garden. Shoppers were especially excited to find pollinator-friendly perennials, culinary herbs, and heirloom tomato plants reaching nearly three feet tall.

A highlight of the sale was the extensive selection of Maryland native plants that support pollinators, birds, and biodiversity. Among the offerings were butterfly weed (*Asclepias tuberosa*), blazing star (*Liatris* spp.), anise hyssop (*Agastache foeniculum*), penstemon (*Penstemon digitalis*), ironweed (*Vernonia gigantea*), blue lobelia (*Lobelia siphilitica*), and sweet Joe-Pye weed (*Eutrochium purpureum*). These native species help create resilient landscapes while providing critical habitat for wildlife.

"The best part of the sale is seeing people get excited when they walk in and discover the variety of plants available, especially some of the harder-to-find native species," said Davis.

The annual plant sale reflects the club's commitment to its theme of "Restorative Gardening." Behind the scenes, hundreds of volunteers spent hours sowing seeds, dividing plants, potting, labeling, transporting, and setting up for the sale. By encouraging gardeners to incorporate native plants and pollinator habitat into their landscapes, MLGC continues to promote environmental stewardship while beautifying the community. Proceeds support MLGC community projects, educational programs, conservation initiatives, and student scholarships.



MLGC 2026 Garden Tour MLGC hosted its signature Garden Tour, celebrating gardening, conservation, education, and community engagement June 27. This year's tour, **Nurturing Nature and Trees by Accident**, highlights the diverse ways gardens, farms, forests, and landscapes enrich our community. The self-guided tour featured four unique properties conveniently located off U.S. Route 219 in Accident, Maryland. From sustainable agriculture and native habitat restoration to cut-flower production to an historic family garden, this year's tour showcased the stewardship and creativity found throughout Garrett.

Honey Moon Farm, offers visitors an up-close look at small-scale, sustainable agriculture and the connections between growing food, flowers, and supporting pollinators. The farm grows vegetables, fruits, herbs, and cut flowers side by side with free-range hens. Intensively planted garden beds maximize production in a relatively small space, reflecting a hands-on approach that relies on careful planning, soil health, and seasonal growing practices.

At the **Hickory Environmental Education Center (HEEC)**, tour visitors experienced a landscape created specifically for outdoor learning and environmental education including a native meadow, arboretum, hybrid (98% American) chestnut grove, amphitheater, and a network of trails that wind through woods and streams. The site also includes the new Naylor

Family Tree Observation Area, an elevated classroom with a wrap-around deck 18 ft off the ground and a 37-ft bridge leading to a tree-viewing outpost. Typically reserved for students, the Garden Tour offered a rare opportunity to experience a canopy-level perspective of the forest. The native meadow, fully renovated in 2022 in partnership with MLGC, includes plant markers and QR codes linking visitors to expanded educational content. It is both a teaching tool and a pollinator haven, demonstrating the vital role native species play in maintaining healthy ecosystems.

One of the most visually striking stops on this year's tour is **Cove Pastures @ Branch Bender Cidery**, the working flower field and gardens of Chester and Trish Yoder, located along Harmon Road in Accident. Visitors enjoy sweeping views from the flower field, where more than 250 peonies of many varieties have been planted over the years. While few peony blooms remained during the tour, the field is vibrant with 25 rows of annuals and perennials for use in Trish Yoder's floral design business, Petal Branch. Surrounding the home and cidery are 173 acres of pasture, woods, and gardens that reflect the property's history. Heritage plantings—including mock orange, lilac, and a variety of ground covers—anchor the landscape and blend naturally with newer additions.

When **My Historic Home on Cove Road**, built in the late 1800s, was renovated in 2016, the garden of Fannie Bender was preserved, and the garden design grew organically from those original plantings. Flower beds were gently mounded and expanded, creating a landscape that feels

deeply connected to the history of the home and the land. MLGC's Floral Design team presented "Branches, Ferns and Found Objects," three times during the tour. This stop on the tour also featured local food vendors, live plein-air painting demonstrations, cooking demonstrations, live music, and free cookies. These four destinations offered visitors an inspiring look at the many forms gardening can take—from working farms and educational landscapes to flower fields and treasured home gardens. As it does every year, the MLGC garden tour invites the community to explore, learn, and celebrate the people and places that nurture nature throughout our region.

Committee News *Continued***CONSERVATION AND ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS: CAROLYN BRAVERMAN, CHAIR**

We are following up on some of the initiatives before the Maryland General Assembly that were presented at the Legislative Summit for Climate and the Environment held early last January. Some of my favorite issues were not passed, but they were also not turned down. Turns out, they are “Referred to Committee.”

We will continue monitoring the progress of these initiatives. The following is the status of these issues as of June 17, 2026:

- **SB342 Maryland Beverage Container Recycling Refund and Litter Reduction Program.** This is a program to increase the use of recycling of beverage containers and reduce litter pollution and the costs associated with beverage containers. So, *stay tuned*. We’ll have to wait until the next session, and hope there is enough support to pass this. Other countries have programs like this and apparently, they are successful.
- **HB 1534 Data Centers – Standards for Operation and Siting.** This is a bill requiring compliance with certain standards requiring the Department of Energy establish by regulation certain sound and vibration controls and backup power generation for Data Centers. There is a lot of concern about the proliferation of Data Centers and their effect on the environment and their use of resources, especially water. There is also concern about the tax breaks that the Data centers get. While this bill does not necessarily address all that, some regulations are being presented.

Here are some bills that passed, that are of interest to those who are environmentally concerned:

- **HB035 Local Government – Regulatory Powers - Regulation of Invasive Trees.** Authorizing the governing body of a county or municipality to adopt certain ordinances to regulate Tree of Heaven and certain invasive trees; and authorizing the governing body of a county or municipality to establish certain programs to incentivize the removal of Tree of Heaven and certain invasive trees.
- **HB0925 Sewage Sludge – Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances – Regulation.** Reducing the percentage of per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances in sludge to levels below 25 parts per billion and establishing certain monitoring protocols for certain substances, etc.
- **SB0431 Fish and Wildlife – Endangered and Threatened Species and Migratory Birds - Regulations, Lists, Petitions, Essential Habitats, and Takings.** Requiring the Secretary of Natural Resources to review and, if warranted, update regulations related to the Irreplaceable Natural Areas Program by July 1, 2033, and at least every 10 years thereafter.

There is more to each of these bills of course than what is described here, but this is the basis.

We hope you will be joining us for this exceptionally interesting and useful landscape design course. This is your opportunity to take back some great information to be used in projects at your garden clubs.

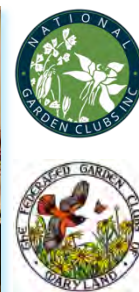

Landscape Design Council Awards

Annually, the Landscape Design Council awards three types of awards:

- Landscape Work at a Public Site; 1st Place, \$150.00, 2nd Place, \$100.00, third place, \$50.00 and honorary mention, \$25.00.
- The Mae Scott Tapestry Landscape Award is awarded to an individual's home or a garden club's planned and maintained project, for a cash award for \$250.00, first place and \$150.00, second place.
- The Habitat for Humanity Award may be presented to an FGCMMD garden club for work at a Habitat for Humanity Site for an award of \$200.00.

Garden clubs and garden club members can put in for any of the Landscape Design Council monetary awards annually by completing one of the award applications on the [LDC page on the FGCMMD website](#) and submitting the application to the LDC chairman by November 1.

Background on the Landscape Design Program from the FGCMMD Website

The Landscape Design Program was established in 1952 by The National Garden Clubs, Inc., to develop in its membership a greater appreciation of the environment, both natural and manmade, and to advance the fine art of gardening, landscape design and the study of horticulture. After a series of four courses, the garden club member is eligible to become a Landscape Design Consultant and may join a Landscape Design Council after two courses by paying dues of \$10.00 annually.

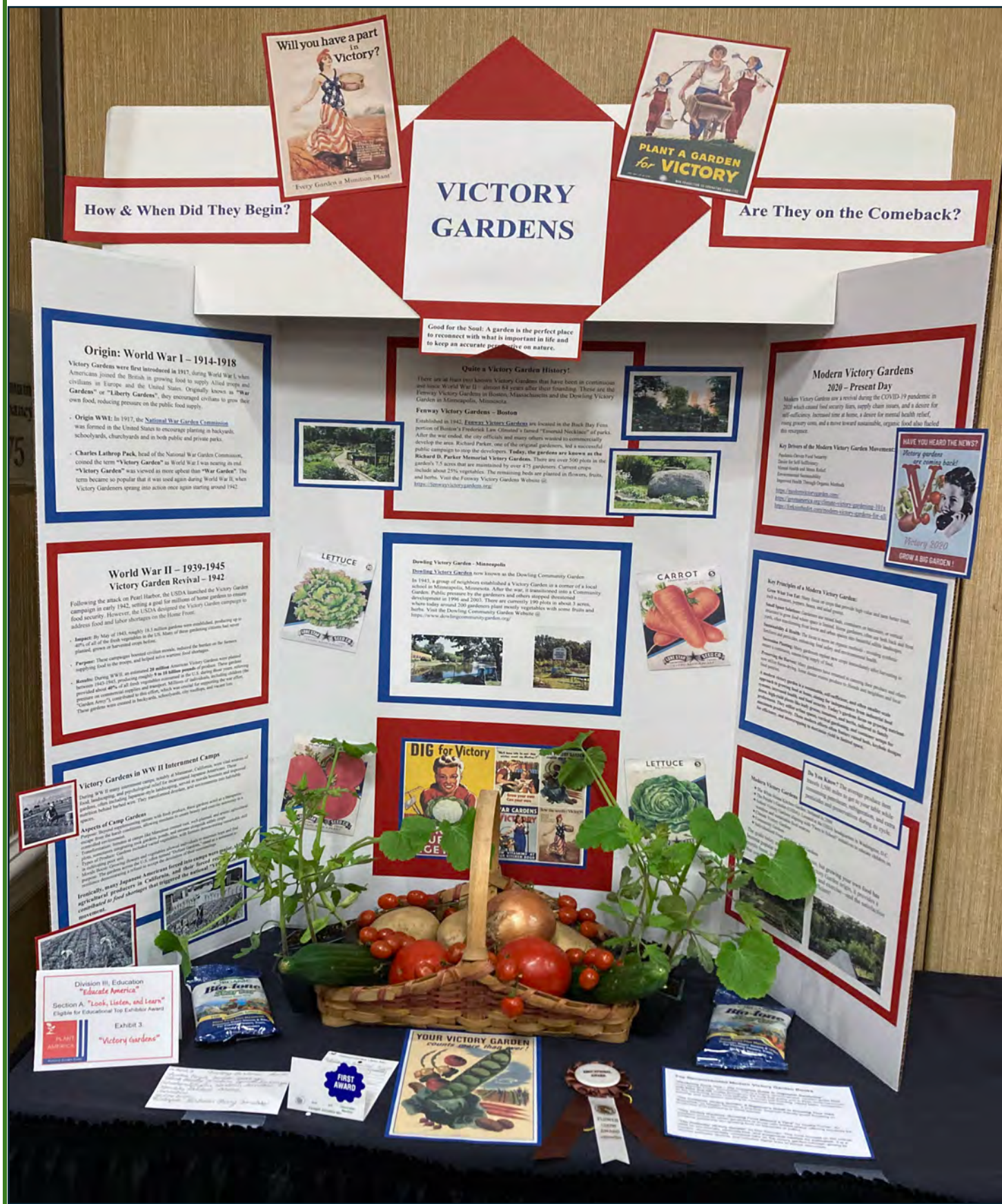
